In the Master of Learning Intervention you will learn how to implement evidencebased teaching that optimises student learning in specialist and mainstream schools and early childhood settings. With a focus on promoting positive behaviour and learning, you will also gain a practical understanding of learning interventions and how these can best be used to support individual needs.

Choose from three speciality areas: Disability, Specific Learning Difficulties and Deaf Education (Teacher of the Deaf).

Outcomes

Our graduates have been employed in special education settings, or in roles in mainstream schools where there is demand for staff who can advise on or adjust curriculum for students with individual learning needs.

Other graduates have been employed in alternative education and early intervention settings. The demand for teachers of the deaf is also on the rise.

The Master of Learning Intervention is offered in two streams:

Stream A involves 45 days of practical experience, including 30 days of placement in approved early intervention and/or school settings. Graduates who complete Stream A will be qualified as Special Education teachers.

Stream B is suitable for allied health practitioners, some early childhood educators, and international students who are not seeking Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT) endorsed special educator qualifications, but who wish to increase their understanding and skills in learning intervention.

New applications can be submitted at any time; however, all applications must be submitted and complete by the closing dates to be considered for each round. We recommend you submit your application at least four weeks before the closing dates, in case any additional documentation is required.

Application process

(01) Check the entry requirements

(02) Write your research proposal

You must provide an extended research proposal with your application. Research proposals should be 1500 words for PhD applications and 1000 words for all other graduate research degrees.

Once you've identified a principal supervisor, your research proposal should also be updated to reflect who they are and how they may contribute to your research project.

(03) Find a supervisor

Find a principal supervisor who will support your research proposal and application. Your supervisor must be a current staff member at MGSE.

We recommend that you search for a supervisor on the University's Find an Expert page (findanexpert. unimelb.edu.au/support/ supervisor.html), or visit our current research projects page (education. unimelb.edu.au/research/projects) to find staff members working on research projects. Please attach your research proposal (or a short summary) and CV when contacting your potential supervisors via email.

Fees, support and scholarships

Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP)

A CSP is a higher education place whereby the Australian Government provides funding towards the cost of your education. For some of our courses, CSPs are guaranteed if you begin your course in 2020. For other courses, a limited number of CSPs are awarded on the basis of academic merit. Places are competitive and the requirements may vary between programs.

HECS-HELP is an Australian Government loan program to help eligible students on a CSP pay their student contributions. No upfront tuition fees are required for students accessing HECS-HELP, and you will only begin repaying your fees once you meet the minimum income threshold.

Fee-Help

FEE-HELP is a loan program that helps eligible Australian fee paying students (both full and part-time) pay their tuition fees. It is available to Australian citizens and holders of a permanent humanitarian visa.

Australian Fee Place

An Australian fee place is a nongovernment-subsided place. Your fees are calculated and payable each semester. This type of fee place is available to Australian and New Zealand citizens and holders of Australian permanent residency visas. Research Training Program (RTP)

Most domestic graduate research students are offered a Research Training Program Fee Offset Scholarship, which is funded by the Australian Government. If you are enrolled under the RTP you are exempt from tuition fees for the normal duration of your course. This exemption is valid for up to four years for students enrolled in a doctoral program and up to two years for a research masters degree.
